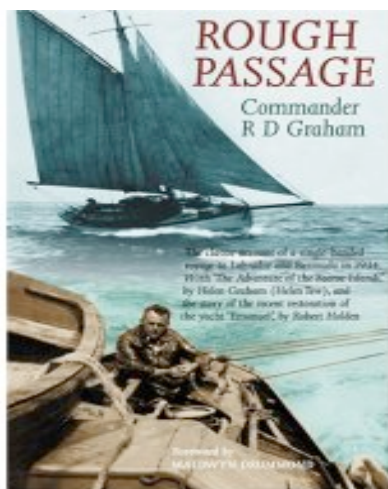


**Rough Passage by Commander
R.D. Graham 1932 (2005 ed)**



The narrative of the first single-handed voyage to Newfoundland, Labrador, and Bermuda in the seven ton yacht *Emanuel* and subsequent return to England.

This voyage is one of the most remarkable and adventurous small boat voyages of modern times.

In 1939 Commander Graham won the Blue Water medal of the Cruising Club of America.

In this new edition there is information about the eight year, 12,000 hour restoration of '*Emanuel*' faithfully carried out by Robert Holden.

Also included is Helen's account of their trip to the Faeroe Islands in 1929.

Afterword by Captain Ian Tew, Comdr. Graham's grandson who circumnavigated the globe, replicating Graham's subsequent voyage 1938/9 in *Caplin* (with Helen Kirwan's mother Marguerite Graham as crew)

For Helen Tew, daughter of Commander Graham (left) the question was never

“ Why sail across the Atlantic in a 26' gaffer at the age of 89 ? “

but rather, ***'Why not?'***

This philosophy determined her entire attitude to life, from her first encounter with the sea as a toddler, to her 'trip across the pond' as a seasoned and experienced yachtswoman

in '*Mary Helen*' the 26-foot gaff cutter which her late husband had designed 65 years earlier.

At the British Nautical Awards in January 2002, Helen Tew was runner-up for the Offshore Yachtsman of The Year Award,

beaten only by Ellen MacArthur.
